MYC Winter Programs

Annual Meeting Summary

Due to government restrictions on public gatherings the 85th MYC Annual Meeting was held Sunday November 15th by tele-video conference with 33 MYC members present and voting. Here are the highlights of the meeting; complete minutes are available on-line here.

In their reports the Flag Officers for 2020, Commodore John Murray, Vice Commodore Bill Keyes, and Rear Commodore Jane Clayton thanked the Waterfront Staff and many volunteers who contributed to an active, although severely curtailed, 2020 season.

Bill Keyes' waterfront report noted that 2020 will be remembered for the significant challenges faced in the operation of the waterfront. Despite the changing restrictions on launch capacity, physical distancing in the Club and on the docks and enforced traffic patterns through the Club and deck, Dock Master Bill Kilham, Assistant Dock Master Haley Woodfin and the entire waterfront staff performed admirably and kept the waterfront operating with a minimum of disruption. Bill Keyes also noted that the floats were

reconstructed over the winter with new composite decking and framing.

Jane Clayton commented on the challenges faced by the House Committee over the past season. Nearly all social functions at the MYC were cancelled because of restrictions on public gatherings. In fact, most of the public spaces inside of the Club were required by health officials to be off-limits for member use and even when indoor space was approved there were severe limits on the size of gatherings. This impacted the Club's Galley Service which was limited to a few outdoor tables, physically distanced with a limit of 6 individuals at any table.

Since the Clubhouse was essentially closed, Jane, along with Bill Kilham, took on the responsibility of managing the Club's Covid 19 response by developing a coherent protocol for dealing with the pandemic. This included sign-in sheets for contact tracing, disinfecting and cleaning, traffic patterns through the property, and signage. Again, despite the troubles the exterior trim of the clubhouse received a new coat of paint, and the parking lot and adjacent property had a long overdue clean up.

The Finance Committee recommended approval of the budget as presented and noted that despite a loss of members due to the pandemic, the Club remained in solid financial position and therefore no increase in annual dues was proposed.

The budget was approved by a recorded vote of the members present.

The Nominating Committee presented a Slate of Officers and Directors for 2020–2021 and the members approved the proposal by recorded vote.

MYC Board approves \$15 increase in Galley Card.

At the December meeting the Board took up the discussion of offering the 2021 contract for the MYC Galley to Diamond Catering and a requested increase in the value of the Galley Card by Diamond Catering. The value of the MYC Galley Card has not increased for several years and with increased cost for labor and supplies the caterer was requesting a \$40 increase in the value of the card. After consideration the Board voted to extend the 2021 contract to Diamond Catering and approved increasing the value of the Galley Card from \$60 to \$75 for the 2021 season.

MYC History Committee

The MYC History Committee meets via web calls, bi-weekly, to review all the interesting tidbits of information we uncover. Much of the Club's history from 1935 to present has been summarized based on readily available meeting minutes, documents and newsletters. However, the pre-1935 history is more elusive and requires real sleuthing. Members have taken trips to Peabody Essex Museum, Registry of Deeds and Abbott Library. We have

interviewed many senior MYC members, shipyard members, and Marblehead historical authorities. We have searched obscure documents, maps, photos and books in libraries, private collections and online. We continue to dig, research and document and are slowly getting closer to creating the MYC History book. The dedicated team members include: John Murray, Doug Burgess, Roger Tuveson, Kathleen Garrigan, Alan Peterson, and Michael Assue.

I wanted to share a story from an older 'Under the Rock' Newsletter that describes why the newsletter is called 'Under the Rock'. I always thought 'Above the Rock' would be a more appropriate name given our Club's situation on the rock ledge.

What is with the name (Under the Rock)? Several generations of the Club newsletter have used the name yet the origin has been a bit of a mystery. There must be a story with great significance. Welcome Jack Mace with his storehouse of MYC history. Years ago, the club newsletter was published on paper and left in a stack at the clubhouse for members to pick up. To keep the pile of papers from blowing around, it was placed under a rock. The newsletter was "Under the Rock." The tradition continues in an electronic format with a periodic update of upcoming events in addition to our great new website.
